



I love that picture. Nothing was going to stop Paul from living out his calling and desire to make disciples. Even though many of his freedoms had been taken from him, he adapted, changed strategies and continued to give himself fully to helping people follow Jesus.

I love this because it's what I've seen GOD do in and through us this year. Despite all the obstacles we faced, this one truth surfaced: the mission of GOD continued to flow through us. Sure, it was a very different year than we were used to having. Many things that we enjoyed and that shaped us spiritually in the past, such as large Sunday morning gatherings, baptism night celebrations, family retreats, to name a few, weren't an option for us this year. And while we mourned the good things that we missed, we adapted, and found new ways to be GOD's people and to live into our mission of Loving GOD, Loving People and Awakening a Movement.





SUNDAY LIVESTREAM


While there was sadness over not getting to be together like we were accustomed to, there was also an excitement that came as we stepped into new opportunities to live out our mission.


I bought a house in The Nations
neighborhood back in 2019 and started

Each week, the Ethos Kids team collected and created resources that equipped parents to disciple their kids at home on Sundays during the Livestream, and all throughout the week.



PRAYER GATHERING

We moved from meeting in-person in the One venue at the Cannery to meeting on zoom for seven months. In September we were able to start gathering at the Ethos office for an in person gathering, while still allowing Zoom for those unable to attend. *Jana Ogg & Cory and Jennifer Barnett* led us each week in praying for our church, city, nation and the nations.



Worshipping at home this year has been HARD. Without leaving the house to "go to church" it was easier to do nothing most weeks. But we found early on, that without school, without church, we were FULLY in charge of both the spiritual and academic learning that our children would receive.



So we spread it out. We incorporated devotions into our morning rhythm each morning, to make sure that we were in the Bible, talking about God, and praying with our children daily. This "normalizes" the behavior of worship, and makes talking about Jesus (and even singing worship songs) that much easier.

We still don't catch every Sunday, and sometimes we watch the livestream in the morning, and sometimes at night. But we always pause a lot, to talk about the words in the songs, or what the pastor is meaning in his message. They're not catching everything, but small important truths are filtering their way in. 
There was a unity in the spirit during many of our zoom prayer gatherings that equaled in person gatherings and

ETHOS DRIVE THRU




FREEDOM PRAYER

That can be a scary, intimidating, and humbling experience. For some, this was their first time ever doing so. Though that can be humbling, I've seen our church grow during this season. This has allowed people to experience what being a part of the family and a part of the church means in a different way.

Sometimes you'll be on the end of helping someone in need, and sometimes you'll be

the one asking for help. Rather than let pride take over, I saw people push through that, even if it was uncomfortable, and let the church be the church for them.

I think in many ways, this has helped transform our church into a more full version of what it was created to be.



A GENEROUS CHURCH

INDIA - PIYAS & SHARBANI DEY

One of the key areas of focus and ministry for Piyas and his team in India is the slums, which is where the poorest of the poor live. When everything was on complete lockdown in India, no one was allowed to travel anywhere, especially to the inner-city slums that were considered a hot spot. Piyas repeatedly applied for a pass to take food to the families in the slums that had no access to groceries. Through his persistence and prayer, the government finally agreed and allowed him to take food to the residents of the slums.

UGANDA- PATRICK & DEE MUHEREZA

When the pandemic first started, Patrick decided that the best thing his church could do was pray. So he started a daily prayer call at 5 am every morning, which continues on to this day. The Parliament of Uganda heard about it and asked Patrick and his team to help them start a daily prayer call of their own. There is now a group that meets every day inside the Parliament to pray for the government and their country.

MACEDONIA - SASHA & MARIA VULETIC

On a normal Sunday, between 40-80 people typically show up to worship with his church family in Skopje. Just like in the US, when COVID hit, Macedonia went into quarantine and Sasha's church moved to a livestream worship. Sasha noticed that most weeks, thousands of people were tuning into their church's live stream. As quarantine lifted, they discovered the hunger and search for GOD among many people hadn't been quenched, but had grown. They handed out over 3,000 Bibles and other books to those searching for the LORD. They also baptized 8 people this summer in a cold river near Skopje.



GREECE - CHRIS AND AMY MOORE

A refugee camp on the Greek island of Lesvos burned down in September, leaving 12,000 refugees homeless. Our missionaries there, Chris and Amy Moore, helped coordinate with the Greek government to help set up a new, temporary camp to house the refugees.


I am eager to see all that God has in store for us in the year ahead as we seek to love God, love people, and to awaken the movement that Jesus began and is still actively leading!
